



For parents of children 0-5 years with additional needs affecting their development and learning



If your child has additional needs affecting their development and learning there is support and services that your child and family will be offered in Cambridgeshire. Not every child with additional needs will require all of the services and not every child will need each service at the same time. However your lead professional and/or Early Support coordinator will be able to assist you in organising support for your child and in turn support your family on this journey.

Support to help meet your child's needs is available, as for all children 0-5 years old, from your:

Health Visitor; a qualified nurse or midwife with additional specialist training and experience in child health. They can work with you offering support and informed advice from before your baby is born until they start school at 5 years. The support for your child and family will be personalised for your family depending on the specific issue affecting your children's health and development and what will work for you.

Children's Centres can offer you a range of activity groups and support for your child and family. Some centres have specific groups for children with additional needs. Children's Centre Family Workers can support you with coping skills, parenting support and signposting to other relevant support. They also deliver parenting courses, including Stepping Stones, designed to support parents of children with additional needs.

Childcare settings are all able to support a child with additional needs, although some may have particular skills or expertise. Together with you the setting will discuss your child's needs, the support that is needed and have regular reviews of their progress.

If your child appears to have more significant and complex needs your health visitor, family worker and/or setting will provide, with your consent, information about your child's needs and make a referral to Early Support.

Early Support is for children that are likely to need long-term support across education, health and care whose needs cannot be met alone by support from universal services listed above.

Early Support

Early Support Coordinators help to coordinate information, referrals, services and support. They also support the professionals working as a team around your child and family and can be contacted by you if your 'lead professional' is not available.

Support will be tailored and coordinated following assessment to meet your child's individual needs, if required from:

SEND (Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities) Specialist Services; a multi-disciplinary team which includes specialist teachers, specialist practitioners and educational psychologists. If needed they can help you plan activities and ways to help your child learn in small achievable steps. This may be at a 'specialist group' at a Children's Centre or similar venue or at your child's setting/school. If your child has social communication difficulties you will be invited to attend a parent's course; Social Communication, Interaction & Learning Skills (SCILS).

Speech & Language Therapy (SaLT); if required, advice and strategies will be provided to:

- Support the development of your child's speech, language and communication. This may include the use of alternative, augmentative communication (AAC) such as Makaton signing or use of symbols and pictures.
- Support for eating and drinking difficulties can be provided where necessary.

Occupational Therapy; if required can:

- Assess your child, if needed, for any equipment requirements and help to aid development in the early stages.
- Give advice and strategies, if needed, on managing sensory sensitivities in the context of everyday activities; this is delivered within parent workshops.
- Provide a consultation and advice if you have concerns about your child's safety in the home.

Physiotherapy; if needed will give advice on your child's physical needs and help to progress gross motor skills, such as crawling and walking.

Community Paediatricians are childrens doctors who have an expertise in childrens behavioural and developmental difficulties. They are involved in diagnosing children with behavioural and developmental difficulties, arranging medical investigations to understand the reasons why children have these difficulties and also treat medical conditions associated with them such as sleep difficulties, constipation etc.
