Worried about your child - where to find help and support?

As a parent or carer, you are the expert when it comes to your child so there is a good chance that you are the first person who notices that "something isn't quite right" in your child's development. What matters is that every child achieves their potential and thrives. Early help and support are key as it gives the child the best life chances.

Who can help?

Speak to your health visitor or GP so that any help your child needs can be given to them as soon as possible. They will be able to help find the best source of help, support and information that matches your child's individual needs.

You don't need to have a name or diagnosis for the thing(s) that are worrying you. You just need to be able to say what you hear and see that is bothering you.
